The Wyandotte Board of Education has approved placing a sinking fund proposal on the March 10th ballot.

Registered voters residing within the City of Wyandotte will vote on a 10-year, 1.75 mill sinking fund proposal.

A sinking fund is a pay-as-you-go method of funding upgrades and repairs to schools and school facilities. Wyandotte Public School's proposed sinking fund will generate approximately \$1,000,000 per year for 10 years. This will not be a tax increase.

Funds generated through a sinking fund can be used for construction, renovations and repairs of buildings, facility security enhancements, and the acquisition or upgrading of technology. They cannot be used for salaries.

Benefit:

The primary benefit of a sinking fund is that the school district does not acquire debt and there are no interest charges.
